On-site construction of the first phase of the Emergency Services Training Centre should begin soon with completion for July 15, the Blyth Business Association was told April 27.

Murray Black and David Sparling of the committee of firefighters building the centre said the scope of the project has snowballed as new needs and new sources of financial

support were developed. Sparling said the centre is now a regional facility. "Twenty-two guys (in the Blyth and District Fire Department) can't justify a three-quartermillion-dollar training facility.'

Eventually the centre will take up four-and-a-half acres, he said, including five training centres and perhaps a sixth. Included will be a fire rescue centre, an auto extrication area, a water-rescue pond and a farm-rescue site.

Black said the desire for the centre came from need for more training for the firefighters. It's difficult to get enough time at the busy provincial training station at Gravenhurst, he said.

Black called the support in the form of donations "unreal", everything from fill for preparing

"When we started this I had no idea how much this was going to cost to I had no idea of how much people would donate," Black said.

Sparling said the group plans to keep the training centre busy and is seeking sponsorships to help keep the costs down for training

People coming to Blyth for training will need places to stay and places to eat, Sparling said.


Though the economic spinoff effect for the community is important, "the real win at the end of the day for the firefighters is if you have a better trained firefighter, if you have training areas there for which there is no training now.

"If we're better trained we're doing ourselves a favour and we're the site to a portable classroom to doing you a favour," Sparling said.

There's still lots of money to be raised, Sparling said, firefighters have made presentations to more than a dozen groups in seeking assistance.

The grand opening will be July 30 as part of the Firefighters Association of Ontario convention.
